- Phonics Consists of:
- Identifying sounds in spoken words
- Recognising the common spellings of each phoneme.
- Blending phonemes into words for reading.
- Segmenting words into phonemes for spelling.





Blending is:

Recognising the letter sounds in a written word and merging them together to read the word, for example

c-u-p becomes cup

Segmenting is:

Chopping Up' the word to spell it out

him becomes h-i-m

Stork becomes s-t-or-k





- Phonics helps children to develop good reading and spelling skills
- Letters and Sounds
- There are 44 phonemes across the 6 phases of letters and sound.

- Phonemes (the sounds made when saying a letter) are represented by graphemes (the way a letter looks when written).
- A grapheme can consist of 1, 2 or 3 letters. For example a, ch, igh.
- A phoneme can be represented/spelled in more than one way (play, they, make)
- The same grapheme may represent more than one phoneme (me, met)

Words that are not phonetically decodable i.e I, the

Words that are not immediately phonetically decodable but that may become decodable later on as new sounds are learnt

 Learning to read the camera words by sight will help a child to read more fluently

- We have recently purchased new books to correspond with the phonics phases.
- Children will now receive a book to take home that will consolidate the new sounds they are learning in their phonics lessons.





Reading

- Read for 10 minutes
- Read a page to your child then get them to read a page. The ratio of adult to child reading can fluctuate depending on the level of confidence your child has.
- Do a book walk. Look through the pictures in the book with your child and discuss what is happening.
- Ask questions. Discuss the book with your child, get them to identify the main characters, re-tell you a part of the story or simply ask them what they enjoyed about the book.
- Read shorter books more than once to develop fluency when reading
