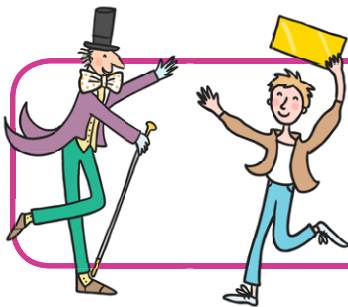


ROALD DAHL

Roald Dahl was born on September 13th 1916. He was born in Wales. Dahl isn't a Welsh name - both of his parents were from Norway. Roald's father died when he was four years old.



Did you know?

Roald Dahl could not find anyone to publish Charlie and the Chocolate Factory for years.

He used to get in trouble at school and was told off a lot. Some people think that he based the character of Mrs Trunchbull in Matilda on one of his old teachers. He didn't enjoy school. He didn't like following rules and wanted to travel to other countries instead.

After finishing school, he went to many different places like Canada and Africa. He flew planes in the Second World War and was badly injured in a crash in Egypt.

After the crash, he moved to America and started writing. When he started, he didn't write children's books. He wrote stories for newspapers and magazines. At this time, he married his wife, Patricia Neal.

Roald Dahl helped to write the film, Chitty Chitty Bang Bang.



Roald Dahl loved telling his children bedtime stories and these bedtime stories gave him the ideas for his children's books. His first published children's book was *James and the Giant Peach*, which was published in 1961. After this, every book he wrote was successful. Most of his books have been made into films.

Roald Dahl sadly died on the 12th of November in 1990. He was 74 years old when he died. In his lifetime, he wrote 19 children's books.

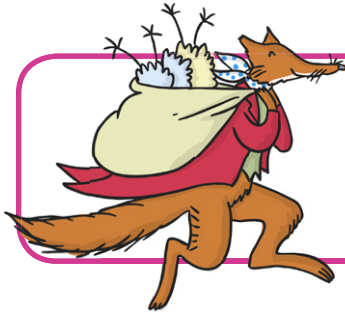

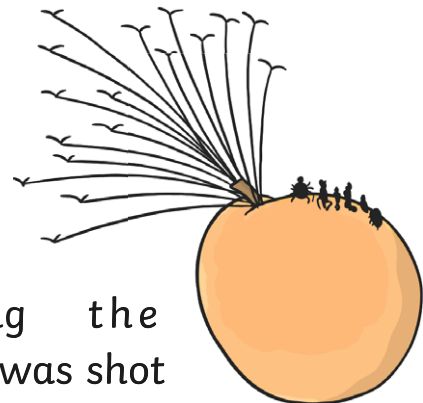


Did you know?

Roald Dahl often found himself in trouble at school as he didn't like the routine or following rules. He was once beaten by his teacher for putting a mouse in a jar of gobstoppers. Roald Dahl never forgot the gobstoppers and they are found in *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* as Everlasting Gobstoppers. He moved school and never went to university, choosing to travel the world instead.

As soon as he could leave school, Roald travelled to Canada and soon after that, he chose to work in Tanzania, Africa. His thirst for adventure wasn't satisfied by just travelling. In 1939, he joined the RAF (Royal Air Force) to be a fighter pilot during the Second World War. During a mission, he was shot

down over Egypt and was badly injured, needing a number of operations that meant he could no longer be a pilot.

As he could no longer take part in the war, he moved to America and started writing for newspapers and magazines. Though he was a good writer, he always wanted to write stories that were more imaginary than real. This was perfect for children's books.

Roald Dahl sadly died on the 12th of November in 1990. He was 74 years old when he died. In his lifetime, he wrote 19 children's books.

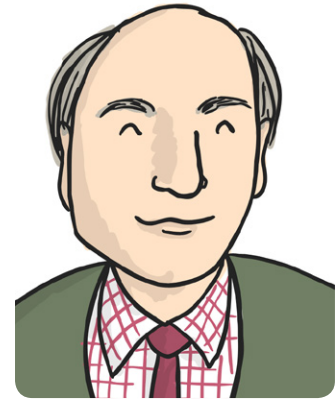

Roald Dahl was writing a third story which included Charlie Bucket after Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator, called Charlie Bucket and the White House, but he died before the book could be completed.

Roald initially attended his local school but was often in trouble. He disliked being told what to do and often received a beating with the cane for pranks and bad behaviour. Once he had used up all his chances, he was sent away to boarding school, the Repton School in Derbyshire. His teachers didn't believe that he had any potential when it came to writing when he was at school, but Roald Dahl excelled at sport. He was a very good

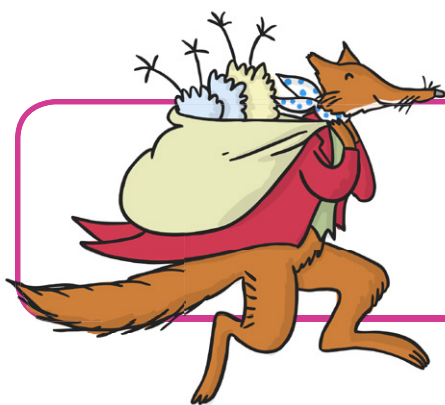

footballer and he enjoyed playing squash. He never wanted an academic future, going against his mother's wishes by not attending university and choosing instead to travel and begin work.

In 1939, he joined the RAF (Royal Air Force) to be a fighter pilot during the Second World War. During a mission, he was shot down over Egypt and was badly injured, needing a number of operations on his hips and spine. The after-effects of these surgeries meant that he was no longer fit enough to be a pilot.

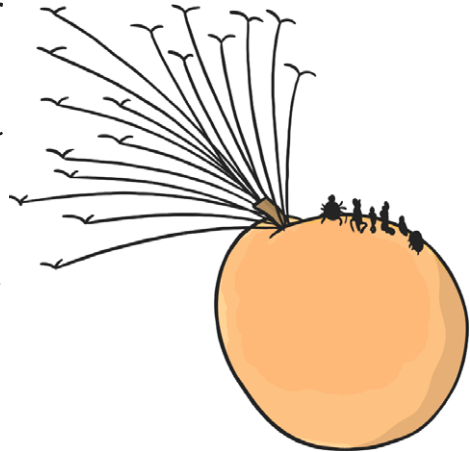
It was never clear that Roald Dahl would become a writer, especially a writer of children's stories. He learned his trade writing for newspapers and magazines in America such as the New Yorker. As his writing developed, editors and other writers guided him towards writing children's books. They thought his style and imagination was perfect for that style.

Roald Dahl sadly died on the 12th of November in 1990. He was 74 years old when he died. In his lifetime, he wrote 19 children's books. He had five children and was married twice. His granddaughter, Sophie, became a famous model and food writer, and had the main character in the BFG named after her. He is buried in the cemetery of St Peter and St Paul's Church in Great Missenden, Buckinghamshire. He was buried with some of his favourite things, including HB pencils and his snooker cues.
